
Working Together, Learning Together

Are eggs alive?

This term we began with a topic all about farm life, exploring the world surrounding farm animals. In maths, we explored subtraction through songs, such as 5 little ducks and 5 speckled frogs, finding one less each time. In Literacy, we read through the wonderful book of Rosie's Walk about a small hen who takes a trip around the farm. In the story, we explored prepositional language: around, in, over, under and through. In Understanding of the World, we made our own life cycles of a chicken showing each stage of the eggs life. 



















































































Friends Club

Key Stage One Present Wriggle and Crawl

Then animate to show how your favourite bug transforms from one to another, perhaps a caterpillar to a butterfly or a maggot to a fly...urgh!!!!

real one or invent one from your imagination!


Be an Entomologist and draw and label the body parts of a favourite minibeast.

Otter Class




We have enjoyed becoming


Make a Saxon sword or a Viking brooch and decorate it with intricate patterns.





Choose to be a Saxon or Viking and trade your crafty goods.





Squirrels Class A Child's War

This term the children in Squirrel class have been experiencing WW2 through the eyes of children. We started with a visit from Jed. He talked us through life during this time.

They built their own Anderson shelter and experienced spending some time in it.

They looked at life as an evacuee through our literacy story 'Spywatch' and then investigated what it might have been like themselves. They dressed up and packed their cases, thinking about the feelings they might be experiencing and why.

To finish off this topic the children visited RAF Digby. They had a talk about life in the Control Room during WW2 and what happened. Then they explored the Control Room and the surrounding rooms learning about people and experiencing wartime artefacts related to the RAF. Finally, they were very excited to see the spitfire plane outside.

6HA welcomes Mr Squire



In an attempt to remove all cash and cheques from school we are asking all parents to only use our e-payment method to order and pay for school dinners. This can be done online using a very secure website called ParentPay.



<u>Already have a ParentPay account?</u>

If you already have a ParentPay account, either with our school or another ParentPay school, you can simply login to that account and add your other children via the **Add a child** tab on your home page. You will have been sent a letter with your activation details.

New to ParentPay?

You have a secure online account, activated using a unique activation username and password; you will be prompted to change these and to keep them safe and secure as your Username and Password for future logins. If you have two or more children at a ParentPay school, you only need to activate one account to create your 'main account' and then add your other children via the **Add a child tab** on your home page. Please visit www.parentpay.com and activate your account via the **Account login** area on the home page of the site.

The deadline for ordering meals will be midnight on the Tuesday before the week you are ordering and menus will be available to order from 16th April 2018 (for week commencing 23rd April). ParentPay holds an electronic record of your payments to view at a later date. Once you have activated your account you can make online payments straight away. Please do not hesitate to contact the school office if you need assistance. Your support in using ParentPay will help the school enormously, Thank you.

Important Information

Reporting illnesses to Transport & School

When your child is ill and won't be attending school, it is very helpful to contact us here at the school on Day One and to contact the transport department at Lincolnshire County Council. We do appreciate that this may not always be possible for parents to do but if LCC receive advance notice of a passenger not requiring transport, LCC can inform the operator. All operators are to wait for a maximum of 5 minutes from the designated pick up time before continuing on the journey if a passenger has not come out, it would then become parents responsibility to transport in these cases.

Social Media

We know how important it is to take pictures and videos of your little ones when we hold events here at the school. However, for the safeguarding of all our children we do ask that you do not share any of these on Social Media websites. Thank you for your co-operation.

If your child has sickness or diarrhoea they have to have been clear of any symptoms for 48 hours before returning to school.




Please could all parents and taxi drivers remember that the speed limit at GHA is 5mph. Please could this be respected at all times. Thank you.
