This term we began with a topic all about insects. We explored the life cycle of a butterfly through the story 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar', and, even, made each stage in cookery - caterpillar biscuits, cocoon cakes and butterfly cakes! We also loved exploring all the different foods linked to the story. We also learned a lot about spiders. We joined in with 'Incy Wincy spider' and 'The Very Busy Spider'. We enjoyed making our own paper plate spiders. To end our topic we went on a 'minibeast hunt' where we found spiders, centipedes, millipedes and woodlice.

We then moved onto exploring jungle animals. We all enjoyed our focus story 'Dear Zoo', lifting the flaps and talking about which animal we'd like for a pet. We have, also, started weekly yoga sessions. In this topic, we have practised poses linked to animals. Our Communication & Language focus has been to act out the song 'Walking through the jungle' using animal masks. In Phonics, we have explored sounds linked to animals, such as 'Z' for zebra and "M' for monkey.

Our memorable experience was a visit from 'Meet the Beasts' and we were able to touch and handle Geoff the boa constrictor and Samba the tarantula, along with hissing cockroaches, geckos and scorpions.

We have painted butterflies and explored snail shell spiral patterns, made spider sandwiches and tasted honey.

In Beavers we have been working towards our safety activity badge and have learnt about keeping safe in the sun, in the water and when



Health Check Feedback

Our school has under gone a Health Check.

On Tuesday May 15th two Head Teachers joined for an 'inspection.'

This is what they said....

The school has a very strong ethos which relates to its rights respecting schools award. The school is very well presented and tidy.

All of the pupils are extremely friendly and polite when moving around school.

The school promotes pupil independence wherever possible and during the morning pupils have a choice of Breakfast club, Sensory circuits and School Choir. All pupils transition around school very calmly to these activities.

The school invests in high quality resources, which support pupil engagement in the classroom. An example of this is that one student struggled to engage in class until provided with a Zuma rocker chair.

The school places a high emphasis on the local community and looks to utilise its links to enhance pupil provision.

The school has also worked towards many different awards/marks that help support the quality of provision. These include Eco Award, Arts Mark, Scouting Schools

Displays are very bright and vibrant. Pupil work is displayed in the corridors, which highlights some of the excellent writing that pupils have completed.

Pupil voice is captured very well throughout the school.

The displays highlight all of the fantastic extra curricular activities that the school provide. Key highlights of this are the family learning activities and the Beavers/Cubs.

Teaching

Support staff are utilised effectively in the classrooms to ensure that all pupils are engaged in the learning process. It was very difficult to tell who is the lead member of staff in each group and this shows just how effective the whole staff team is.

The classrooms have been designed in such a way that it allows for pupils to demonstrate and develop their independence. Pupils in the classroom are expected to collect all resources for themselves. The similar layout of classrooms in the school also ensures that transitions from class to class are seamless.

Key findings can be seen below

- Activities are clearly tailored to pupil's individual needs.
- Pupils are actively engaged in activities.
- Questioning stretched pupil learning.

Behaviour

Behaviour of pupils has been exceptional during the school day. All pupils have been incredibly polite. Pupils are engaged in the classrooms and have a clear understanding of the work that they have to complete. At play time pupils are all well behaved and are encouraged to support each other with activities. The school has a clear ethos and drive for pupils to be as independent as possible. This was evident during the day as pupils are allowed to transition around school unaccompanied to the room/activity that they are due to attend. The school has very strong leadership with a clear vision for how to develop pupils learning for the future this is consistently embedded throughout all aspects of school life. We are delighted with their findings.

Reporting illnesses to Transport & School

We do appreciate that this may not always be possible for parents to do but if LCC receive advance notice of a passenger not requiring transport, LCC can inform the operator. All operators are to wait for a maximum of 5 minutes from the designated pick up time before continuing on the journey if a passenger has not come out, it would then become parents responsibility to transport in these cases.

We know how important it is to take pictures and videos of your little ones when we hold events here at the school. However, for the safeguarding of all our children we do ask that you do not share any of these on Social Media websites. Thank you for your co-operation.






Please could all parents and taxi drivers remember that the speed limit at GHA is 5mph. Please could this be respected at all times. Thank you.
